From the Rector

I sound silly I know, but I am totally excited about the opportunity to serve Christ our Lord by supporting this program that I believe can deepen the spiritual life and journey of all who participate. Be aware that introductions will be shared during the Car Show in September, the 2nd Saturday Ethnic Pot Lunch dinner on 9/9/17 and during the Forum between Worship on 9/17/17. For your sake and our Lord's blessing come and see what can be a life changing series of events for you and your friends!

Canon Wamsley will be with us on the 10th of September for both masses and for the Forum to hear about who we are and the mission of the congregation. The Bishop wants his staff to know the congregations of the diocese and to learn how to “smell like the sheep”! From Fr. Kline

By way of introduction, I want to thank you for inviting me to come alongside you and be part of the team that inaugurated your Spanish service on Easter Sunday and for the incredible opportunity to get to know new friends in Christ and to acquaint myself with the heart of a joyful, gifted and welcoming fellowship in Christ, which is Christ Church, Pottstown.

Your hospitality and openness has cheered me, as I watch how you are in small ways and great, welcoming, and integrating folks of very different language and culture into your family – so much so that I am beginning to brag about you. I am telling, for instance, the Bishop, and just the other night, the Deanery Plenary, and just about anybody who asks about gospel ministry in Norristown, that we all can learn from you.

What can we learn from you? We can learn what people with big hearts and the love of Jesus know in their bones as they wake up every morning – we serve a good God and he has called us to be healers and reconcilers, merciful ambassadors of God's grace in a fallen world. We can learn, we must faithfully remember, that we have no time to lose. To follow Jesus and his pattern of calling all to mission (as he walked by the Sea of Galilee!), Christians, as a rule, throw caution wind. We rise up and reach out, and do so boldly, with confidence.

Here is a rule. God, through his Word, gives us a vision of his kingdom come in the age of the Spirit (his will being done!). The pattern of Jesus's life is shorthand. He is risen and ascended filling all things with his gifts and grace. He is interceding for us at the right of the Father, channeling those gifts and graces throughout his Body in the world, the church. That vision of a blessed and blessing family takes shape on the horizon of our hearts and communities as we walk in mission, as we ever more faithfully step out into being vessels of the signs and wonders of healing and reconciliation that God wants to spread abroad.

So, at the end of the day, vision actually comes from mission. When you ask, "What is the vision here," you are really asking, "What is our mission" – what are we capable of and what will we do even though we might

doubt we have the capacity to do it! A church's vision can only be incarnated in each one of us through mission.

Por ejemplo - some of us are feeling called to learn Spanish, to understand what it is to bless the people right outside our doors with "La Paz de Dios", to understand what refugee and immigrant families face in our community today, to understand how we got to where we are with regard to what is actually taking place in migrant and immigrant families, to understand how we come to have claims to being Americans, etc! We do this not taking a political stance, but a practical one, seeking for solutions to suffering and strife and the God planted longing for a better life. We do this respecting laws and limits, but also advocating and witnessing to just, compassionate, and wise outcomes.

Bottom line – if we seek a vision through actual mission, and not through history or fantasy, our sight and purpose for living faithfully in Christ will be constantly renewed. We will never be tempted to ignore what is really going on around us, but do the hard work of being agents, midwives of kingdom outcomes.

You have already opened your parish home to a new set of families. They rejoice to think they have found a place where they belong. Most Sundays, the word is preached (in a crazy mix of Spanish and English!) in the choir, and bread broken and shared at the altar. On other Sundays you are blessed to see Rita, your evangelist, welcome and translate so that all celebrate our hope in God together. Meanwhile, you are already in the process of advocating for some who face difficulties in a growing atmosphere of fear and misunderstanding, doing all you can to keep families intact and explain new realities. Most of all you are incorporating a younger generation that longs to be integrated into the regular life of the parish, to be named and blessed as family.

In sum, vision comes through God's revelation and is constantly renewed in mission. I rejoice that you have acted in that spirit, through the Spirit, so that we, and going forward the whole Diocese, are partners in what God is doing in Pottstown. Thank you for your faithfulness. Thank you in advance for your continued prayers. Let Fr. Bill, Warden Bob, Evangelist Rita, Deacon Robin know what God is nudging you to do. I appreciate you all. God is so good!

Streetwise

The theme of this column considers how God acts to change the institutional church. Today we will notice two recent ecumenical events that occurred in Pottstown.



FIRST, on August 9th, Bishop Daniel Gutierrez met me at Christ Church to walk the streets of Pottstown, ending up at the picnic supper held each Wednesday ostensibly for those who have stayed in the mobile homeless shelter during the winter months, but open to all the poor and homeless in our Borough.

(People who are street-homeless do not disappear in the summer. There are tent encampments primarily on the Chester County side of the river from Pottstown to Spring City, PA.)

For the Rev. Kork Moyer and his shelter staff, it important to stay in touch with shelter guests. Thus, the weekly picnic prepared each Wednesday by the shelter staff at Christ Church. Bishop Daniel and I walked a circuitous route, covering from Hanover St. to Washington, St., even wiggling through alleys. We notice the remnants of the Christmas fire and the presence of the several addictions recovery houses. It was a pleasant evening and people were outside. I walk the route often and know the people. We greeted each other with hugs and stopped to pray with a few. When the Bishop and I got to the supper, people came up to me, naming me “De’ek.” Clearly we know each other very well. I felt a great sense of

joy when the Bishop began to introduce himself to the picnickers as Danny. On the way back to our cars, Danny spoke with enthusiasm, saying, “We have been the church in action and truth.” I see this as an example of God changing the institutional church by opening Danny’s eyes to the importance of being present in a different way with the poor and homeless.

SECOND, on Thursday, August 17th, at 6:00 PM, in front of the Borough Hall at Smith Plaza, there was a Vigil in Unity with those harmed in body and spirit in Charlottesville, Virginia. The plaza space was crowded. A few of us from Christ Church found each other. The program was long and powerful, with speaker after speaker. Notably, most of the speakers held formal authority and power in the Borough. The message was clear: What happened in Charlottesville **will not** happen here in Pottstown.

Regarding the church as an institution in which God acts to create change, one of the first requests at the Vigil was to call the clergy to stand together. The Vigil, of course, was not a religious event, but the presence of God’s power was palpable. Pottstown challenged itself to be a community of social justice and equality. Pottstown leadership acknowledged that inequalities are structural problems that need to be addressed. And important, the institutional churches are now charged to lead the way. To me this calls us at Christ Church to open our hearts and minds, as many of us have, to strengthen and change for the better our own Borough.

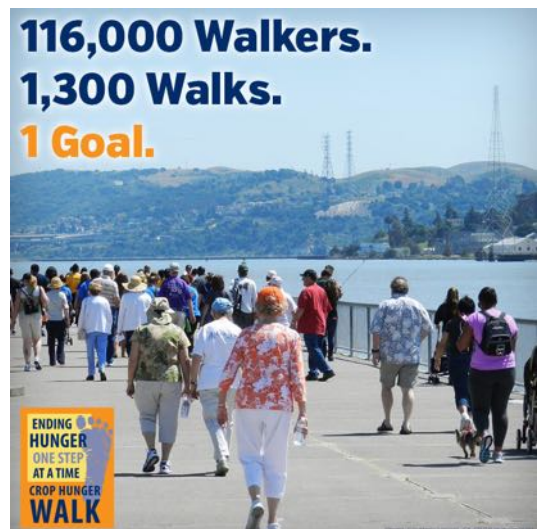

Ministry of the Month - Lay Eucharistic Visitors

“For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there I am in the midst of them.” Matthew 18:20



A Eucharistic Visitor is a layperson authorized to take the Consecrated Elements following a Celebration of Holy Eucharist to members of the congregation who, because of illness or infirmity, are unable to be present at the Celebration.

Their work is both sacramental and pastoral: sacramental since they bear the sacraments of the bread and wine on behalf of the church at large as part of their ministry, and pastoral as they must be prepared to act pastorally to those they visit.

Eucharistic Visits may take place in a home, hospital, rehab center or nursing home. A Visit will include prayer, the gospel reading of the day, comments about the sermon of the day, a confession of sin, the Lord's Prayer, the sharing of Holy Communion and a closing prayer.

The Eucharistic Visitor is commissioned at the end of a service with the following prayer:

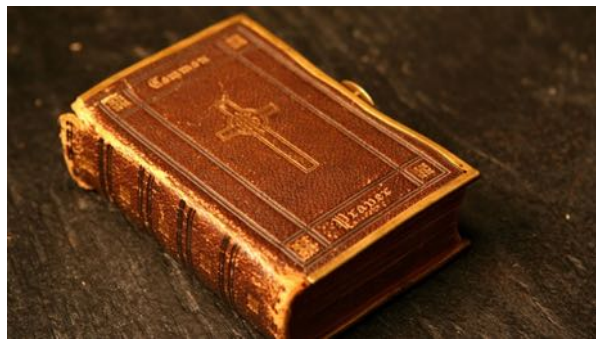
Celebrant: In the name of this congregation, I send you forth bearing these Holy gifts, that those to whom you go may share with us in the body and blood of Christ.

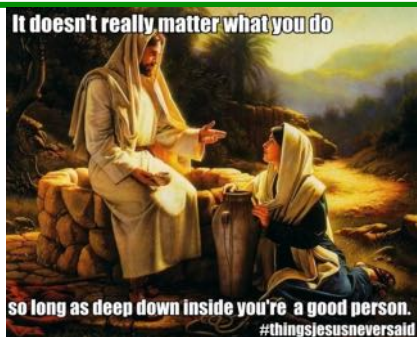

Don't forget your Giant Gift Cards

When you buy a Giant gift card at church, you get the whole value of your purchase, and Christ Church receives 5% of your cost. It does not expire and purchases with it earn Giant Rewards Points, which can be redeemed for gas or food discounts. As an easy fundraising mechanism, it's hard to beat.
