To Glorify God Through Worship, Nurture, and Service

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Como me preparo para viajar a Pittsburgh para una semana de reposo estoy pasando el calor como todos ustedes. Recuerdo la vieja canción que dice: ¡verano y la vida es fácil, peces saltan y el algodón (maíz por aquí) es alto! El idílico letra de la canción es cantada por una voz entrenada para evocar un sentimiento de paz y tranquilidad, centrándose el oyente más allá de las preocupaciones y cuidados del día, incluyendo el calor y pensando en una oscilación en el porche, bebidas frescas y de brisa verano. Busco algo de eso esta semana que viene.



Sin embargo, no importa cómo duro tratamos de escapar de las realidades del mundo constantemente nos rodean con sus distracciones, especialmente en la era digital actual. En el pasado no muy lejano tarda días, meses o incluso años para se refieren a eventos más allá de nuestra configuración actual y el concepto de noticias manufacturados era un elemento básico del día. Qué papeles vendidos no era la verdad de los acontecimientos pero la verdad energizado para excitar. Escucho esto en la pregunta antes de Jesús de Pilato mientras que él era decidir qué hacer con él.

¿Qué es verdad? Es ley inmutable? " Pilate fue confrontado por enojado celosos líderes dependiendo de su poder de control sobre las personas. Su 'verdad' que querían era para ellos la única respuesta, Jesús tuvo que morir, que era la verdad! Pero Pilato de detección de la falsedad de su 'verdad' querida una respuesta de Jesús para solucionar el dilema. Él sabía que tenía que mantener la paz, incluso si significaba condenar a un hombre falsamente. Esto no le gustaba, por lo que quería Jesús para justificar las acusaciones de la multitud o darle una buena razón para dejarlo ir. ¡Jesús no dice nada! De forma predeterminada, los triunfos de la multitud, la verdad es falsa y Pilato lava las manos. 2000 años después todavía estamos discutiendo sobre la pregunta '¿Qué es verdad?'

El intenso calor del día nos alienta a buscar refugio en los confines de aire acondicionado de una casa, una tienda o un lugar para nosotros que nos mantendrá fresco. Pero no disminuye el hecho de que es caliente afuera no importa cuánto lo queremos ser diferentes (tibia no caliente, fresco, no frío).

Para nosotros los cristianos, es la verdad, vida, muerte y resurrección de Jesús no fue simplemente un refugio del calor y las tormentas de la vida sino más bien una manera de vivir verdadera y totalmente expuestos a las dificultades de la vida no tiene miedo, sino más bien anima a afrontar la vida en términos de la vida. Somos una comunidad de fe con el mandato de entrar en el horno caliente de la vida para continuar el trabajo que tenemos

ante nosotros.

Nuestro Señor nos conceda tiempos para encontrar refugio tras la tormenta no una forma de ejecutar de las realidades de la vida, sino como un tiempo de refresco para hacer frente mejor a lo que está por delante. Nos da la palabra de la edad y el Sacramento de la vida para bendecirnos y animarnos a vivir adelante. También, proporciona tiempos de oración, reflexión y recreación que nos da tiempo para reenfocar las prioridades en la vida.

Por lo tanto, estoy en mi camino por un corto período de tiempo en Pittsburgh, mi lugar de retiro, cerca pero lo suficiente para recargar las baterías. Ruego que sus tiempos de peregrinación bendecidos y refrescante en este momento del año o en cualquier momento elija. Pero siempre recuerda que el curso por delante todavía espera su participación. No creo que desaparezca. Cristo es contar, en quién (o qué) ¿dependes? ¿Qué es la verdad? ¿Y cómo se vive?

Para mí, a servir al Señor, porque él es mi Dios y mi salvación. Yo soy su siervo y en servicio estoy cumplí. Reconocerlo como mi verdad, mi camino y la vida que he sido llamado. Actualizarse y saber que Dios ha dado todo para que usted pueda tenerlo todo en la vida y en muerte.

Common Prayer

As Anglicans (of the US variety) we share an extremely important resource with the rest of the Anglican Communion – a book of *Common* prayer. Note the emphasis. In our current environment where “new” is a synonym for “good,” we have, at the center of our faith, something old. The BCP dates originated in 1549 and was updated only minimally for over 400 years. One of the main criteria for the 1979 BCP was that it maintain a continuity with the original. How well that criterion was held to is a moot point, but to anyone reading both, the commonality is easy to see.

So, why is that a big deal? Imagine yourself in a regular Sunday Mass as an average, mostly illiterate, English subject before 1549. What do you see and hear; what is your experience of worship?

You will see a man in fancy dress enter, go to the altar, and start talking. Some of that will be to you, some to God, but all of it will be in a foreign language. With luck, there will be a sermon, possibly in French, maybe (!) in English. More likely, it will be in Latin. It’s not totally unintelligible - you know a number of words and phrases and possibly a basic idea of what the priest says, but no matter how well done and how devout you are, you are only an observer. Even the Bible reading would be Latin.

Down the road, however, is a monastery or convent. They have organized worship as often as 7-8 times a day, and are taught to understand what is said and what it means, and to internalize it. You don’t really have that, unless you are wealthy and have taken it on yourself to learn Latin.

In the upheaval of Reformation, particularly the English part, and Henry VIII’s issues with getting an heir, Henry separated the English church from

ownership by Rome. Henry did not push reform of worship or doctrine; he remained a devout Roman Catholic till his death.

Thomas Cranmer, the Archbishop of Canterbury (the head prelate in England,) with Henry's approval, realized the need to have English rather than foreign (Latin) worship, both for reasons of faith and for national identity. He took the monastic services and turned them into a structure that could be done both publically and privately, by anyone. It was in English, so was understandable by anyone. We had Matins (Morningsong if sung) and Evening Prayer (Evensong) with the advantages of the monastic worship life available to all. He added the Eucharistic service with rules mandating the language of the people, and surrounding prayers and psalms. Most of all, he took most of the *BCP* from the *Bible*.

England had Common prayer. While other groups have books of prayer, it is difficult to find another example that had such a profound effect on worship, faith, ethnic identity, and history.

Cranmer's remarkable writing talents came when Middle English was at the point of becoming Modern English. The fact that the BCP was read every Sunday in every parish in England (Henry also made Sunday attendance mandatory) set the linguistic style for the *King James Bible* and Shakespeare, and the future. It had the added effect of moving Saxons and Normans in the direction of being English.

To illustrate, remember the start of the Marriage Service - "Dearly beloved, we have gathered..." You can look in most denominations' service books and immediately detect the influence of the BCP. English is full of phrases originally (in English) from the BCP - "to have and to hold," "moveable feast," "pass our time in rest and quietness," "peace in our time," and numerous others.

Even in other languages, the prayerbook resembles the BCP. In his writing of the Prayerbook, Cranmer wanted the people of England to be constantly exposed to the Bible in a language they understood. He succeeded well beyond his highest hopes. The *Prayerbook* has evolved, both in English and other languages, but world-wide, we pray together.

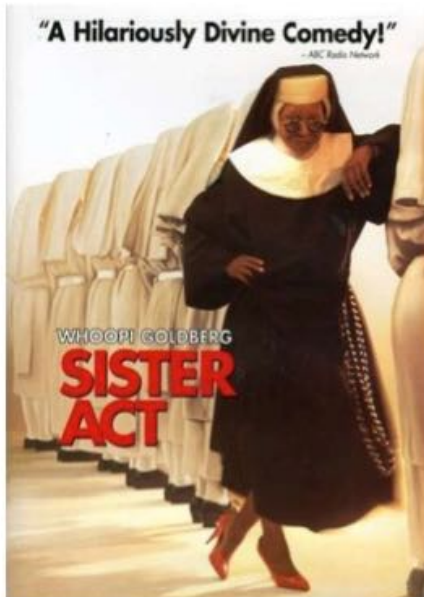

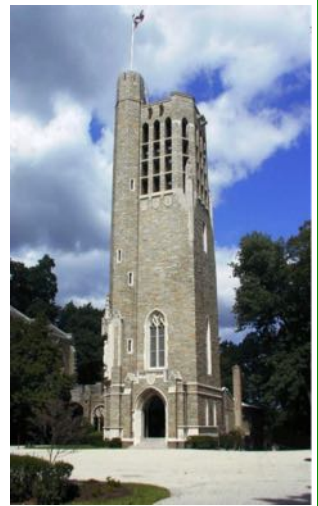

Vestry Notes

What's your Vestry been doing lately. Here are some significant items.

1. As part of our tithe from Bob Connit's bequest, we approved a grant to St. Peter's, Phoenixville (where Joe Dietz is deacon, and Lou Steffenhagen has been deacon-in-training) Food Pantry. Bob Shanley volunteers there. We also approved grants to Harris Family Ministries for their House of Restoration ministry, Habitat for Humanity for projects in Pottstown, to Centro Cultural Latinos Unidos for Hispanic ministry, to Birthright of Pottstown for ministries to needy mothers with new infants, and to Meals-on-Wheels.

2. Purchased portable audio/video equipment for use by such ministries as Second Saturday events, Alpha, etc.

3. Funded supply and advertising costs for a Fall Alpha program.

4. Approved purchase of more Bibles (including large-print) and Prayerbooks for Adult Forum. Some Prayerbooks will be replaced with outworn ones in church.

5. Approved initial funding of a parish photo directory, which should be available by the end of August. There will be no charge for the directory, but we would appreciate donations to cover the cost.

6. Approved an Alpha program to begin on 19 September, for 11 weeks.

7. Approved final payment for the stonework, and disapproved the contractors proposal for cleaning the remaining stone (too expensive.)

8. Discussed what to do with the old steeple cross and whether to put up a new one. No decision yet.

9. Began discussion on a proposed Financial Policy being produced by Rick Stoudt and the Finance Committee. On approval, it will be followed by a *Financial Procedures Manual*.

Steeple Cross

We have two big questions to decide regarding our cross. First, the Vestry has agreed that replacing the current one is too expensive, but we can (probably) manage a lighter replacement. (The reason is that the current cross is heavy enough to require added internal carpentry and a crane, at a fairly high cost. A lighter replacement can be installed without major carpentry and with just a cherry-picker.) Do we want, or need, a cross on our steeple? If so, what?

Second, what shall we do with the old cross (below.) Suggestions so far have been a) hang it on a wall indoors, b) put it in the Memorial Garden (on the wall or free-standing,) c) put it standing in front of the church (perhaps near the sign,) or d) put it on the gate to the Memorial Garden.

The Vestry has agreed to take this slowly and solicit thoughts and feelings from you. Please let them know what you think.
